LOON UPDATE



We have enjoyed another summer with our Loon's successfully breeding and nesting on Raspberry Island, resulting in one

healthy chick who is thriving on our Lake now. In mid-July, one parenting Loon disappeared, but the chick continues to enjoy being fed by its remaining parent – but soon will be encouraged to feed on its own full time as the adult prepares for migration, typically leaving for coastal waters a few weeks before the chick does – in answer to questions, this seems to be the migration pattern ..

We continue to have a "lone" loon who comes each summer but does not have a mate The "Lone" Loon attempts to visit with the chick and its parents, but they drive it away after allowing the "Loner" to hang near them for only a short time. There have also

been sightings of another Loon couple in the southern area of the Lake, but they did not seem inclined to nest.

Sharing some Fun Facts:

- As they get closer to migration, our lake may enjoy some social gatherings of multiple Loons at one time.
- Typically mature Loons tend to mate for life, returning to the same nesting sight if they are successful in raising their chick/s.
- One lead sinker can kill a loon from lead poisoning. It is almost 100% fatal once wild life is entangled in discarded fishing line if not rescued shortly following entanglement so please do not abandon a loose line!

Thank you to everyone for observing boating safety that allows us to enjoy our wild life on Silver Lake!

2023 FALL ENVIRONMENTAL

The 2023 Spring survey showed a large increase in the acreage of Eurasian Milfoil (EWM) that needed to be treated. There were 21 acres to treat. This was due to a lighter that normal snowpack and warmer than normal temperatures. Silver Lake was not alone in the increase of EWM. There were many inland lakes that saw large increases.

The Fall survey showed that we currently have about 6 acres to treat which shows that we have once again greatly reduced the EMW with the spring treatment. We will treat the lake again this fall to hopefully reduce the existing EWM throughout the winter. The treatment will have occurred prior to your receiving this newsletter. We also have 3 small patches of phragmites, also an invasive species. These 3 areas are relatively small.

With fall comes the falling of leaves and

yard clean-up. Whether you do this yourself or hire an outside source to clean up your property, please make sure to have them removed from your property and not put into



the lake. Have a great winter and we will see you in the spring!

SILVER LAKE DRAIN UPDATE

The Silver Lake drain is currently working as designed, the current lake level is well below the established threshold of 862.00 feet, at which point the water will drain.

The Roman Drive gauge was at 862.40 on 5/11/23, which is 4.80 inches above the threshold and comparably was at 862.28 on 5/9/22, which is 3.36 inches above the threshold of 862.00, seasonally the water drains out of the lake when the level is higher than 862.

As of 8/21/23, the Roman Drive gauge was at 861.42 which is 6.96 inches below the threshold. Again, comparably on 8/25/22, the gauge was at 861.44, showing that the last two years are very similar for August. Typically water levels decline throughout the summer because of evaporation and home irrigation systems. Of course rain helps refill the lake, which we have not had a lot of this summer.

SHORELAND STEWARDSHIP REPORT

The SLIA board set up a new committee last year to investigate causes and cures for shoreline erosion around the lake.
They have been diligently investigating and even putting into place new practices on their own properties and are sharing their findings and thoughts with the community.

Did you know it is possible to have a landscaped lawn and swim area, while using healthier methods to protect your shoreline from erosion? Utilizing bio-engineering methods to protect your shoreline such as Coir (coconut fiber) logs, natural vegetation and appropriately installed rip rap can protect your property. Hard shoreline structures such as rock walls and improperly installed rip rap can reverberate energy from wave action, and result in more erosion.

Did you also know that turf grass has a very shallow root structure that cannot hold the soil in place against wave action while native vegetation has deep root structures that will hold it in place?

Some SLIA members have registered with the Michigan Natural Shoreline Partnership (MNSP) which has a wealth of resources to understand the options and solutions, these are just examples of so much more information that is available.



LAKE KRATOCHVIL


What if we said "We live on Lake Kratochvil" instead of Silver Lake – now wouldn't that be interesting?

In researching Silver Lake's history – found this to be true. I found much information on its original platting as Kratochvil Plat, including family information and pictures, how it came to be named Silver Lake – quite fascinating – this is the story ...

The U.S. congress passed a bill in 1820 to sell "public lands", mainly looking at states that weren't as developed, so in 1866 President Franklin Pierce sold a large section on the NW corner of the lake shore area to the Martindale's, it changed hands several times and finally was purchased by the Kratochvil's in 1897, they built a homestead, purchased more property and developed their own little community and it became known as Kratochvil Lake.



They even platted out a section along the lakeshore known as Prospect Park in 1902, which it is still called. Interesting that West Silver Lake Rd was still known as Old State Road?





When did it become West Silver Lake Road?
The Kratochvil's continued to purchase more land around the lake, and owned a piece on the SW end in Blair Township, labeled H D Silverdale on the following map.

The story goes that one of the contingencies of the exchange of property between the Kratochvil's and the Silverdale's was that the Silverdale's wanted the lake name changed to Silver Lake – and it did happen!



Am continuing research into the lake history – as more information becomes available, will share ... if anyone has more data, would welcome hearing from you and hope you have enjoyed what we have so far.

One final note, we have a Kratochvil family descendant that has moved back to the lake recently - Welcome, it is an honor to have you - your ancestors are happy, we're sure!
