
CHAIRMANS COVE




Next year, it was suggested that we have a "Silver Lake Regatta" trophy, something to pass on annually. Also, some sort of gathering following the sail


COOKIN' CORNER

THE LAKE MANAGER VIEW

In the last newsletter Stan Lievense gave his comments on the fishing conditions. In this article Stan takes the view of a "lake manager" and gives his comments about Silver Lake.

"Silver Lake is what is known as a valley lake. This is a lake that is relatively deep with limited shallow edges. Because there is not a lot of weed cover and a limited food supply

in relationship to the total acreage, "Silver Lake is perfect for Walleye & Pike"

Silver Lake will never produce huge numbers of fish on its own. In comparison, Houghton Lake, for example is a shallow, weedy lake that can produce an endless supply of fish."

"The amount of pan fish (blue gills, perch etc.) will be limited in Silver Lake because the predator fish (walleye, northern pike and bass) will keep the numbers down. The good news is, while fewer pan fish may be caught, there should be much larger pan fish in the lake as a result."

"Silver Lake is perfect for Walleye and Pike as they prefer a depth of twenty feet or less. This leaves unused room in the depths of the lake for trout. Planting trout again in Silver Lake would be a great experiment." Submitted by Jim Lievense

WHERE'S THE WALLEYE?

According to the DNR, the walleye are here and doing quite well. Pondreared, 1.5" walleye fry are planted every 3 years by the DNR. In June of 2000, 24,000 fingerlings were planted. A follow up survey in September 2000 showed these fish were 8.3" and had a good survival rate. These walleye are now 11"-14" and are a bit ahead of the state average growth rate. Most of the walleye being caught now are 17"-21" and are from the 1997 planting (20,000). The most recent netting survey was done in 1994. It showed that Silver Lake has an abundance of shiner minnows and small perch, a walleye delicacy. Pike numbers are declining. This is blamed on the loss of weedy habitat that results from heavy lakeside development. Overall, Silver Lake is a healthy and varied fishery. Do you have an interesting SL fishing story?
